From The Class of 1998

Editor's Note: Local baseball researcher Richard Cuicchi has made a study of the group of 207 players who made their major league debut in the 1998 season. Cuicchi's report gives the the reader an insight into where modern major leaguers are coming from and what they do early in their careers. Here are some facts taken from Richard's report, which was presented at a recent local chapter meeting of SABR (Society for American Baseball Research.) Reprinted in part by permission.

- 207 players appeared in a major league game for the first time in 1998: 115 in the National League, 92 in the American League.
- 160 (77%) of the 207 players making their major league debut in 1998 were born in the United States. The Dominican Republic (15) and Puerto Rico (12) were the countries with the next most players.
- The tiny country of Aruba supplied two major league rookies last year, **Sidney Ponson** and **Radhames Dykhoff**.
- Three more Cuban defectors entered the major leagues in 1998: They were Rolando Arroyo, Orlando Hernandez and Vladimir Nunez.
- The recent movement of Asian pitchers into American baseball continued with the addition of **Masato Yoshii** and **Jin Ho Cho** at the major league level. Neither played at the minor league level in the USA prior to their major league debut.
- In 1998 57% of the players who made their big league debut attended college for at least a year. Miami and Florida State eachprovided four players. The University of Southern California and Wichita State three each.
- A number of 1998 rookies had played on the same teams in college. Following are some of the most notable of these:

- When **Jay Payton** debuted on September 1, 1998 for the Mets, he became the fourth member of the 1994 Georgia Tech team (College World Series runners-up) to reach the major league level. The others were **Nomar Garciaparra** (1996 Red Sox), **Jason Varitek** (1997 Red Sox), and **Brad Rigby** (1997 Athletics).
- Travis Lee and J.D. Drew were selected as the Golden Spikes Award winners in 1996 and 1997, respectively. This award is given annually to the college player of the year. Both Lee and Drew debuted in the majors in 1998.
